<u>Lín's Letter</u>

In all church communities there is often talk about faith journeys and sometimes talk of life journeys. Conversation revolves around the things that have happened to us during our lifetime, not just our joys and sorrows but our experiences. We are also well aware of migrants and their journeys to safety and a better life. Even with our Methodist Church we talk of a 'movement', nothing in life stands still.

I'd like to write a little about the difficult journeys people in the Bible took, focusing on Mary and Joseph, the Magi and Jesus. They all endured journeys and at times got thrown off course.

Mary and Joseph went from Nazareth to Bethlehem on dusty roads. Mary, heavily pregnant must surely have just wanted to get to Nazareth quickly and have a rest. They arrived tired and weary and found nowhere nice to stay. Any possible plans they had for their end destination, went out of the window. A manger for her new born son, was all that she could have. Later on, in a dream, Joseph was warned to escape to Egypt to avoid Herod. Egypt wasn't their chosen destination.

The Magi, when they went in search of the one who had been born king of the Jews, came up against Herod. They went to Bethlehem, found the baby and presented him with their gifts. It was on realising how precious this child was that they decided they would have to go home by different route.

Jesus, of course, had an itinerate ministry and was constantly travelling. His sole aim was to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim freedom to prisoners, recover sight to the blind, release the oppressed and proclaim the Lord's favour. (Luke 4: 18-19)

His journey wasn't easy. He took his friends with him and they journeyed through the good and bad. Jesus' journey took him to the cross, and for a moment in the scriptures we get a glimpse of his anguish about this, but he put himself in his Father's hands.

All of these people stayed together, through thick and thin and journeyed under God's guidance. So must we, sharing in love and working together for God's purpose.

St Wilfrid's Chapel

A former Anglican church at Church Norton; a rural location two miles from Selsey in West Sussex, which itself is pretty remote.

Thought to be on the site of an ancient monastery built by St Wilfrid, from the 13th century until the mid 1860s it was the Parish Church of



Selsey. Then half of it was dismantled and moved to the centre of the village where it was rebuilt, added to and became St Peter's Parish Church. Only the chancel of the old church survived in its remote, harbour side location where it was rededicated to St Wilfrid and served as a Chapel-of-Ease until it was declared redundant in 1990. Since 1990 it has been in the care of the 'Churches Conservation Trust'.

Eddie's Service by Rudyard Kipling

Eddie, priest of St Wilfrid, in his chapel at Manhood End, ordered a midnight service for such as cared to attend.

But the Saxons were keeping Christmas and the night was stormy as well.

Nobody came to service, though Eddie rang the bell.

"Wicked weather for walking", said Eddie of Manhood End.

"But I must go on with the service for such as care to attend."

The altar-lamps were lighted, - an old marsh-donkey came, bold as a guest invited, and stared at the guttering flame.

The storm beat on at the windows, the water splashed on the floor.

And a wet, yoke-weary bullock pushed in through the open door.

"How do I know what is greatest, how do I know what is least?
That is My Father's business," said Eddie, Wilfrid's priest.
"But – three are gathered together – listen to me and attend.
I bring good news my brethren!" Said Eddie of Manhood End.
And he told the Ox of a Manger and a Stall in Bethlehem,
and he spoke to the Ass of a Rider that rode to Jerusalem.

They steamed and dripped in the chancel, they listened and never stirred. While, just as though they were Bishops, Eddie preached them The Word. 'Till the gale blew off on the marshes and the windows showed the day, and the Ox and the Ass together wheeled and clattered away. And when the Saxons mocked him, said Eddie of Manhood End.
