

Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends,

As I write this, I am just recovering from the best part of a week spent in bed after contracting Covid for the second time. It has been a slightly frustrating time - I have missed being able to be out and about seeing people, and the bedroom walls did seem to be closing in somewhat after a couple of days. Nevertheless, the wonders of the technological age enabled me to keep in contact with friends and colleagues, as well as joining in with the circuit service via YouTube and a catch-up with other ministers in their early years of ministry on Zoom.

An important part of the mission that we all share in as Christians is looking to build relationships and form community with others both inside and outside of the church. For all of its faults, new technology such as social media has provided us with another way of helping to build those relationships. It was great to be able to take part in a Digital training morning with people from across the circuit at the end of September as we learned more about utilising these technologies to reach out to the communities around us and interact with people of all ages online, to make the love of God for all known more widely.

Alongside this, the opportunities to build relationships in real life, such as taking young people from across the circuit to 3Generate (see article on pages 9 & 10) are always much appreciated. There is nothing like a week's self-isolation to bring home how much we are designed to live in relationship, and how valuable it is to spend time in the company of others.

Jesus spent much of his ministry building relationships and living in community (whilst also making time to be with God by himself). His words, when asked about the most important commandment of all, serve as a useful guide to us when we consider how we should live relationally - 'love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind... love your neighbour as yourself' (Matthew 22.37-39). One of the

From the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference Statement issued on 10 October 2024

We mourn the tragic loss of life in the Middle East over the past year. Even in the light of the suffering of Gazans over so many years, the extreme attack by Hamas militants on civilians in Israel on October 7th, causing the single biggest loss of life to the Jewish community since the Holocaust, is horrifying.

The abduction of women and men to be held as hostages substantially increases fear and suffering within the population of Israel.

The Government of Israel's chosen response has seen the deaths of over 40,000 people in Gaza. Schools, universities, houses, water systems have been targeted and whole areas of Gaza reduced to rubble. Religious and cultural buildings, tower blocks, houses and a university have been blown up after they have been evacuated.

The physical devastation is so extensive it is difficult to imagine how a community could be rebuilt in the future.

The physical and emotional trauma of the people of Gaza is also profound. So many have been physically injured or are grieving for lost family members. In the West Bank the expulsion of Palestinians from houses and neighbourhoods has increased.

These actions on the part of the Government of Israel do not appear consistent with an intention to establish a future peaceful settlement. Rather they are likely to convince a new generation of Palestinians that Israel is their enemy.

In recent days we have witnessed the deadliest attacks in Lebanon for many years. Somehow the cycle of violence must be halted.

We trust that on both sides there are many who, while increasingly fearful, nevertheless desire political accommodation over conflict.

Our prayers are for a viable future for Israelis and Palestinians; a future that is respectful of another's dignity and that turns in a markedly different direction to the violence of the past year.

We are convinced that such a future is only likely to be realised with the principled involvement of the wider international community.

All of us at Katharine House were delighted to receive your wonderful donations totalling £605, raised by Banbury Methodist Circuit at the recent final service in Adderbury Church. How kind of you all to support us this way, we are so grateful.

Katharine House Hospice provides specialist palliative care for adults across north Oxfordshire and south Northamptonshire. We believe everyone with an incurable, life limiting illness should be given the opportunity to live as fully as possible, from the point of diagnosis until their final breath.

We pay Oxford University Hospitals Trust (OUH) a grant to provide all our clinical services. We receive some government funding which covers about one third of the hospice's total costs, but this Means we need to continue to fundraise \pounds 3m a year for the remainder. Last year it cost more than \pounds 4.7m to run Katharine House Hospice, that is \pounds 12,995 a day. Your support is so important to us, so we can carry on providing vital care to our patients – completely free of charge.

We supported over 1300 families last year and the need keeps growing so your gift really makes a difference to those families and the others that will need our help in the future.

World Toilet Day - 19 November 2024

Take a moment to think of how many different toilets to which you have access. You've probably got at least one at home, several at uni or work, plenty in all the cafes, shops and local places you visit. Then, think about twinning your toilet (either at home or in your church). The principle is simple – you choose a toilet you use, and 'twin' it with one given to a community who are in need of safe places to go to the toilet.

For more information, visit https://toilettwinning.org, where you can donate £60 to twin your toilet. They will email you a certificate* to print at home and hang in your loo – showing a photograph of your overseas toilet twin and GPS coordinates so you can look up your twin's location on Google Maps!

*Or, you can choose at checkout to order a framed or unframed certificate, which will be posted to you.

Twin your toilet and fund a community project that helps families to build their own basic toilet, access clean water and learn about hygiene – a vital combination that saves lives.

3Generate 2024

More than 1,600 children and young people aged 4 to18 years, 560 leaders and 340 volunteers from across the Connexion attended *3Generate*, the Methodist Children and Youth Assembly. This year's *3Generate* was held at the NEC, Birmingham from Friday 4 to Sunday 6 October.

3Generate is a vibrant weekend of fun and worship...This year it started on Friday evening with icebreakers and a welcome session that set the tone for the weekend. Throughout, speakers, artists and musicians shared their inspiring stories and encouraged those taking part to share their own.

The venue was made up of over twenty areas, each one with its own theme – including the Tech Hub, theatre and an inflatable chapel. The weekend was packed with activities for the guests,... the youngest attendees (aged 4-7) enjoyed their own *Mini 3Generate* area with arts and crafts, storytelling and interactive games.

The event had two new venues this year that offered young people the opportunity to look at faith in a different way: the *Discovery Centre*, where children could focus on self -exploration and take part in faith conversations that were facilitated by Cliff College, and *Eden*, a reflective space celebrating God's creation. In The Tech Hub, alongside the games and a repair café, participants could hone their social media skills at a TikTok creation workshop.

The Girls' Brigade ran the Village Green venue and the Boys' Brigade facilitated a prayer pilgrimage.

Throughout the event, attendees could participate in dance, climbing and various sports, or simply relax at the Village Green, a communal area for socialising and unwinding. There were also numerous opportunities for prayer and worship, with dedicated sessions for reflection and spiritual growth. Workshops covered topics such as mental health, social justice, and environmental stewardship, led by experts and activists in these fields.

One of the highlights was the Saturday evening 'Barn Dance and Ceilidh' at the Arena, followed by a reflection from *Metal Methodist*. Additionally, there were talent shows and open mic sessions where young people could showcase their skills and creativity, notably the '*3Gen from Scratch*' singing and theatre held in the Park.

On Sunday, the closing sessions were more reflective, with a collective prayer and a call to action, encouraging the young attendees to take what they had learned and experienced back to their communities.

Team leaders also enjoyed the event and slept on site in tents close to the young people in their care.

The event emphasised the importance of community, spiritual development and the young voices in the church. It was a weekend of growth, learning, and celebration, leaving a lasting impact on all who attended.

From Rev Phil Robinson.....

It was a pleasure and privilege to be able to take a group of eleven young people aged 8-15 from across the circuit (along with four adults) to this year's *3Generate*.

Despite a few hiccups across the weekend (mainly transport-related), there were some real highlights - it was great to see how enthusiastically the young people participated in an amazing range of activities (VR escape rooms, musical theatre, caving, jewellery making to name just a few) and discussions (such as Bible studies, seminars on neurodivergence in the church and protesting social justice issues).

Sharing in a final worship time with almost 2000 youngsters on the Sunday was also a very special experience and seeing how our group engaged with what was going on made my weekend. Despite all the hitches, I am so glad that we went, and look forward to being part of the group that will head to *3Generate* 2025!

Protection

An article in *National Geographic* several years ago provided a penetrating picture of God's wings.....

After a forest fire in *Yellowstone National Park*, forest rangers began their trek up a mountain to assess the inferno's damage. One ranger found a bird literally petrified in ashes, perched statuesquely on the ground at the base of a tree.

Somewhat sickened by the eerie sight, he knocked the bird over with a stick. When he struck it, three tiny chicks scurried from under their dead mother's wings. The loving mother, keenly aware of impending disaster, had carried her offspring to the base of the tree and had gathered them under her wings, instinctively knowing that the toxic smoke would rise.

She could have flown to safety but had refused to abandon her babies. When the blaze had arrived and the heat had scorched her small body, the mother had remained steadfast. Because she had been willing to die, those under the cover of her wings would live.
